Congregational Meeting Information on Possible Purchase Opportunity

Hello friends,

I have been thinking quite a lot about the prospect of purchasing the Grocery Pub property and turning it into our new physical home. This is particularly important to me as I am the incoming board chair, and as such will be bearing a lot of responsibility for the direction we take through the next two years.

It feels a bit like we are in the middle of an avalanche of activity and ideas, and also some anxieties. I am sending this out before our congregational meeting July 3rd to decide whether to place an offer on the property. I think it is really important for us to take

a moment to breathe, step back, and look at the bigger picture of what we want long term. I feel like there is a bit of chaos and haphazardness to the process unfolding right now, and we need to be more grounded before making this very important decision.

It is important to discern what exactly we want, and how we are going to achieve it, and to ask if having this building and space will get us there. What exactly is the best use of our resources, financial and human, right now?

We need to know that this is truly the best thing for our congregation. Yes, we have been in uncertain territory since covid, and then the loss of the space at St. Paul's, and the recent loss of the meeting space with the Quakers...it has been disheartening and really difficult. Because of these things it is exciting to imagine having our own space to do what we like, and when. And it really is a sweet spot in many ways! In this light, let's take stock of the pros and the cons of the UU Grocery Pub. These are not exhaustive lists, only what is on my mind, so please add to them as you see fit.

PROS

- 1. Affordable, unusual opportunity for financing
- 2. Building is in excellent condition
 - 3. Main meeting space is adequate for our primary worship service needs, and can accommodate some growth
 - 4. Very usable outdoor space that won't require huge amounts of work to maintain.
 - 5. Potential for producing some income through rental as meeting and venue space
 - 6. Decent neighborhood with a park nearby
- 7. Central location, convenient to most of our group
- 8. Potential to create kitchen area
- 9. Parking is adequate

CONS

- 1. We will need to tap into our savings to place a significant down-payment (important to keep our mortgage payments manageable)
- 2. A lot of modifications will need to be made to make the space usable for our purposes, e.g. A LOT OF WORK, and money.
- 3. Ownership always comes with unexpected costs: are we prepared to deal with damage, repairs, ongoing maintenance?
- 4. We will be responsible for all utilities, including internet service.
 - 5. Inadequate space for children/RE this is a HUGE problem if we hope to attract young families to the church.

- 6. Limited space for social activities, e.g. tables to sit around for discussions, meals, etc.
- 7. Possible lack of human power to take care of all the little and big things that need to be managed
- 8. Non ADA compliant bathroom; there is only one bathroom.
 - 9. Purchase of building and subsequent costs may interfere with our stated desire to support the SOUUP intern minister program

Our mission statement says:

The Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Klamath County seeks to offer a forum for religious freedom and the pursuit of knowledge, to extend spiritual fellowship to all people, and to provide a place of renewal to foster a life of community, awareness and action.

We need to ask ourselves if purchasing this building helps us achieve this mission. As we prepare to have a congregation-wide meeting to vote on the purchase of the Grocery Pub, please read over this carefully, add anything you might think of and bring your thoughts to the table. I welcome any responses by phone or email as well.

The June 25th closure of the 2023 UUA G A means we have a new UUA president. The UUA is 62 years young, since 1961 merger of Unitarianism & Universalism. (Our fellowship became part of American Unitarian Association April-1957.)

Early UUA presidents:


Rev. Dr. Dana McLean Greeley, 1961-1969, last president of AUA; peace activist, civil-rights leader

Rev. Robert Nelson West, 1969-1977, authorized Beacon Press to print the Pentagon Papers. <u>WOW</u>!! Our UUFKC car-pooled to RVUUF in Ashland to hear David Ellsworth speak on papers. West established UUA Office of Gay Concerns, authorized UUA's first religious education curriculum on sexuality; created,"UU WORLD" newspaper; was credited with saving UUA from bankruptcy; saw congregational growth.

Rev. Paul Nathaniel Carnes, 1977-1979, supported desegregation, civil liberties; established affirmative actions for women and minorities in ministry; reinstated UUA's Dept. of Social Responsibility (particularly racial equality). He died two years into his term (lymphoma-1979).

Rev. Dr. O. Eugene Pickett, 1979-1985, selected to complete Carnes term, then <u>elected</u> president; authorized creation of hymnal, SINGING THE LIVING TRADITION; facilitated rewriting UUA principles; responsible for UUA's first major capital campaign & UUA donor program.

This concludes the first four UUA presidents & their historical impacts. Next newsletter at the end of July read Part Two, note the formality change from use of gents' full names, to use of middle initials, to, "Call me Bill"; marriage equality, and an "Oregon connection".
